1. African social and economical context

- A continent with high level of multidimentional poverty where the majority of population lives bellow the International Poverty Line of USD 2.15 a day;
- A continent with high level of social inequality; people with access to livelihood, including goods and services, and people with limited access to livelihood.

2. The impact of second-hand market in Africa

Poverty and dignity	In Angola, 80-90 percent of people dresses second-hand clothes
Limited sources of public funding	Annually, governments take over 73.5 millions tax revenues and they use it for economic and social development of their countries
Unemployment and the right to work	Second-hand market in Africa has been contributing for the access to job for many people and their families. 1.28 Million people are employed in Angola, Guinea- Bissau, Malawi, Mozambique and Zambia
Enviornment and climate change	The large numeber of people looking and using the second-hand goods is an indicator of protecting the planet.

3. Second-hand approach: Does it make sense in Africa?

- Development is a process made by people for people according to their level of Education and instruction. What is old for a given population it can be not for some;
- The value chain of second-hand creats not only job for people but also allows people to participate in the process of the development of their countries;
- When people are employed they are focused in thinking positively.
